Red Nose Day




Red Nose Activities

Journey into (cyber) Space

Students from Park House have entered a national competition to get their work sent into space. The Astro Pi competition, as it is known, was started in 2015 when British astronaut Tim Peake took two computers into space with the aim of using them to run scientific experiments dreamt up by young people from across Europe. The competition has grown in popularity with each passing year and, last year, students from Park House School were lucky enough to see their code being sent to the International Space Station for use in the experiments. Mr Philips, Head of Computer Science, hopes to repeat the success again this year.

He says: "This is an excellent opportunity for the students to get involved and have a chance of getting their own code sent into space. When your code has been run on the ISS, you will receive a certificate telling you what your code did in space, and its position in orbit at the time your code was run."

Students who entered the competition, which closed on March 25th, were advised that this was serious stuff.

"The code needs to be checked before being beamed up to space," added Mr Philips. "We don't want bugs to be occurring in the middle of space!

Phoebe G, a coding club regular, said, "Coding club is an engaging lunchtime club that encourages logical thinking through coding."

Lucas from Year 11, who took part in last year's competition, quipped, "I like Pi, you like Pi, we like AstroPi!"

"I wasn't sure if I was going to come at first but I'm glad I did because it was so much fun.


"I really hope they're going to do another one because it's really nice to be able to relax with your friends after working so hard during the day."




